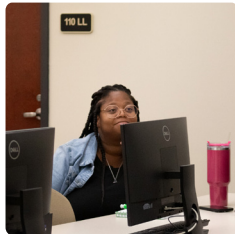
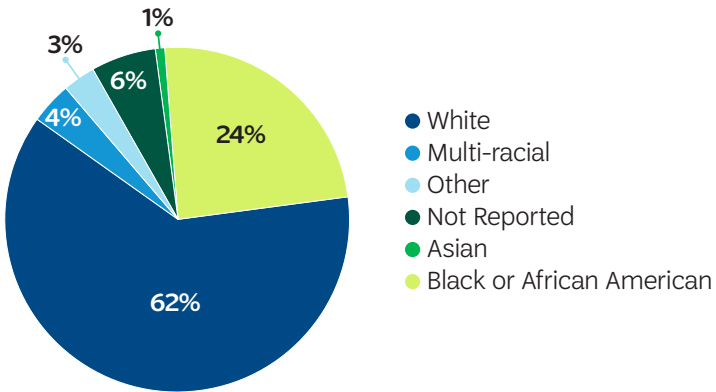

Membership

In Membership Year 2023 (MY23), we continued our focus on attracting new members and retaining existing members.

In 2023, our council served 5,667 girls and 3,038 adult members. We retained 71% of our girl members and 81% of our adult members. Our overall membership increased by 8.6% over Membership Year 2022.

We are proud to report that our girl membership closely reflects the diversity of our 22-county jurisdiction, and we will continue to focus on developing diversity.



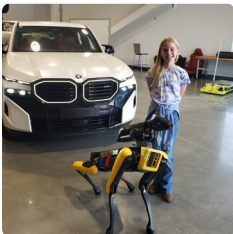

Program

In MY23, we served 1,569 girls through 80 programs and 480 volunteers through 30 trainings. We added 16 new program partners, like CampCodeKidz and Clemson College of Science, and cemented our existing program partners, like BMW and The Greenville Drive.

While hiring summer staff remained a challenge, our 2023 summer camp season was a success. We served a total of 655 girls across our three camp properties:

- 349 resident campers at Camp WaBak
- 230 day campers at the Cathy Novinger Girl Scout Leadership Center
- 76 day campers at Camp Mary Elizabeth.

Girl Scout Product Program

Girl Scout Cookie Program

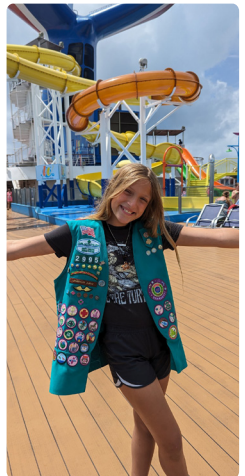
The Girl Scout Cookie Program is the largest girl-run business in the world. Every year, Girl Scouts learn business and financial skills and earn money to fund their Girl Scouting goals. The Cookie Program aims to empower girls through the development of five essential skills: goal setting, money management, people skills, decision making, and business ethics. In 2023:

- 3,982 Girl Scouts participated
- 306 per girl average
- \$978,062 in troop proceeds
- \$111,355 in Cookie Dough for girls
- Blue Star Mothers sent 12,495 packages of cookies this year to service members through our *Gift of Caring* program.

Fall Product Program

The Fall Product Program is directed toward family and friends and enables troops to earn start-up money by selling magazine subscriptions, as well as nuts and candy. In 2023:

- 957 Girl Scouts participated
- 340 per girl average

Property Rental

Girl Scout troops continued to play and learn together at our properties, and we also saw an increase in rentals from outside groups, especially at the Cathy Novinger Girl Scout Leadership Center. Property rental income increased to \$49,780 in MY23 from \$27,340 in MY22.

Stewardship

During MY23, 2,072 girl prospects were generated online. We had an 87% conversion rate, compared to 74% in MY22. 76% of girls joined within one day of creating their account, up 3% from last year.

1,970 leads were generated by council and GSUSA recruitment and marketing efforts. 31% of those leads were converted, resulting in 452 new girls and 160 new adults.



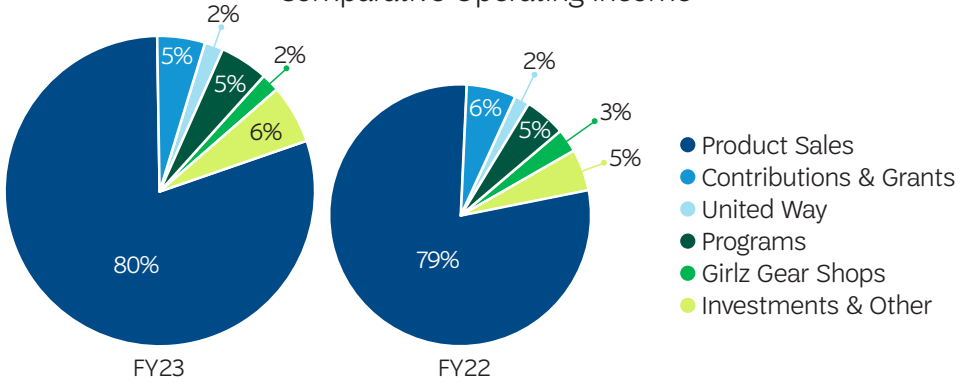

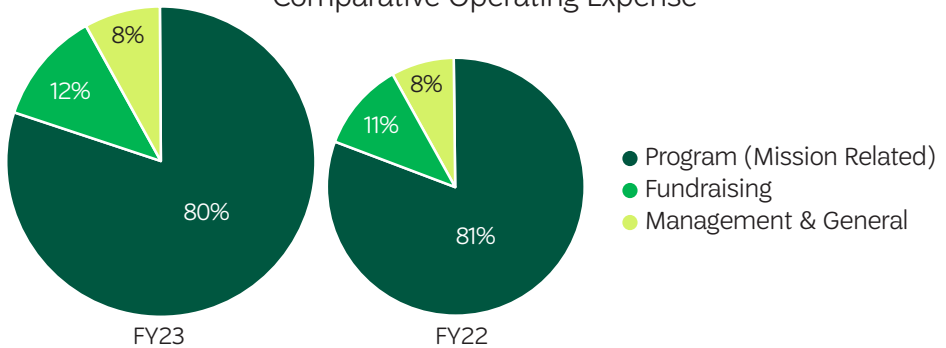
Effective Operations

Comparative Operating Income



- Operating income increased 5.6% over prior year
- Overall fundraising down, but United Way support increased
- Product sales revenue up 6% due to membership increase and increase in average product sold per girl
- Decrease in retail sales revenue due to less assistance provided
- Revenue from investment income increased due to higher interest rates and non-cash market gains in invested accounts

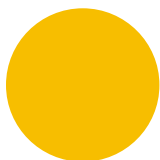
Comparative Operating Expense



- Total expenses 0.5% higher than prior year
- Salaries and related expenses increased 4.0% over prior year due to cost-of-living adjustments
- Increases in telecommunications, occupancy, utilities, automobile expense, and bank fees due to technological and other improvements made to our properties, higher utility rates, more travel within the council, and higher credit card processing fees for product sales
- Decreases in professional fees, supplies, assistance, & interest expense

Fundraising

In 2023, we focused on increasing and diversifying our funding. We also grew our team, adding two new positions. Through the generosity of donors and staff, we were able to accomplish great things in 2023:

- We celebrated five Women of Distinction in Columbia and at Boots and Pearls in Spartanburg.
- In partnership with Iron Hill Brewery in Greenville and Steelhands Brewery in Columbia, we held Girl Scout Cookie and beer pairings.
- Together with Marketing & Communications, we created two appeal letters, a revised annual campaign booklet, a record-setting *Midlands Gives* online campaign, the design of a new philanthropic publication (coming to your mailbox soon), and collateral material for our Women of Distinction events.
- We raised more than \$421,000 to surpass our FY23 goal.
