

The Girl Scout Alum Difference

To understand Girl Scouting's long-term benefits, the Girl Scout Research Institute (GSRI) conducted a national study with 1,000 Girl Scout alums, 800 women who were never Girl Scouts, and 922 Gold Award Girl Scout alums. This study shows Girl Scout participation is a powerful factor for developing courage, confidence, and character, which in turn build a foundation for success in education, careers, and life.

small number of Girl Scouts are selected to act as honorary pages in the South Carolina Senate and House. During their time there, they learn about how legislation becomes law, our state's history, and meet their lawmakers.

Governor Henry McMaster, SC First Lady Peggy McMaster, and their beloved pup Mac met virtually with the girls. They answered questions and shared information on their responsibilities. Lt. Governor Pamela Evette also joined the girls virtually to discuss why she serves our state. The SC Women's Legislative Caucus (also known as Troop 1912) joined us and shared a proclamation, declaring the week of March 12 Girl Scout Week.

At the end of the week, Girl Scouts presented mock campaigns for the office of their choice.
