The Girl Scout Gold Award

The Girl Scout Gold Award is the highest award in Girl Scouting, earned by Girl Scout Seniors and Ambassadors who have chosen to further develop their leadership skills by planning and completing a project that reflects their values and addresses an important community issue, involves others in the execution, and creates long lasting change. Gold Award Girl Scouts have worked a minimum of 80 hours to complete all the requirements. More than 100 colleges, universities, nonprofits, and other national organizations offer scholarships specifically to Gold Award Girl Scouts. The military recognizes Gold Awardees as they enter their service by promoting them to a higher pay grade.

Girl Scouts are happy and confident, thriving on new adventures and experiences. Girls become more empowered as they move through the Girl Scout Leadership Experience, a set of activities and challenges designed to deliver specific benefits to girls at every age level.




Advocacy

Girl Scouts has a long-standing commitment to the well-being of girls. We emphasize these public policy priorities:

- Promote economic opportunities for girls and build the nation's future workforce by increasing girls' involvement in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) and strengthening their financial literacy and entrepreneurial skills
- Encourage girls to embrace a healthy lifestyle by expanding their access to outdoor activities, preventing bullying/relational aggression, and promoting healthy relationships
- Foster global citizenship and a global voice for girls
- Uphold a strong nonprofit community that supports the Girl Scout Leadership Experience

Girl Scouting Works!

Half the women in the United States today were Girl Scouts at some time in their lives. According to a Girl Scout Research Institute report, *Girl Scouting Works: The Alumnae Impact Study*, Girl Scout alumnae display significantly more positive life outcomes than those who were not Girl Scouts. Research proves they have a higher sense of self, education and income levels, and a higher rate of volunteerism and civic engagement.
