Serita Acker earned her bachelor's degree from Lander University and a Master of Education in Human Resource and Development from Clemson University. Before becoming the PEER/WISE director in August 2015, Serita was Director of the Women in Science and Engineering program. Additionally, she has more than 25 years of experience in higher education, both in the areas of student support services, mentoring, and diversity programs. She is a certified Global Career Development Facilitator and Academic Coach. Serita sees the PEER/WISE main role as providing student success programs and services that can equip students with the resources they need to excel at Clemson University and achieve their educational goals so that they are prepared for success after graduation.

She has won several State and National Awards: Clemson University Woman of the Year, Martin Luther King Jr. Award, Clemson University Board of Trustee Award, WEPAN Distinguished Service Award, Career Communications College Level promotion of Education Award, Upstate Diversity Award Calder D. Elhmann Outstanding Individual.

She also serves as MentorLinks Consultant for the American Association of Community Colleges in Washington, D.C. and sits on many state and national boards to help promote STEM. In her spare time, she enjoys reading and traveling.



Jane Ballard Dyer has lived her whole life in a "man's world." She graduated from Clemson University in 1981 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. While at Clemson, she was the first female Commander of Air Force ROTC and was the first woman selected from Clemson to become a pilot in the Air Force. As one of the first female Air Force pilots, she flew Air Refueling aircraft and was an Undergraduate Pilot Training Instructor Pilot.

After serving in the Air Force, she continued her flying career by becoming a Captain at FedEx, flying the B727, A300, and the B777. She flew around the globe and amassed over 11,000 accident free hours. In a career field that is still around 5% female, she has been inducted into Smithsonian's Air and Space Wall of Honor.

Jane is married to John Dyer, a highly decorated combat pilot. They have four children, three grandchildren and a great-grandson. She now spends her time volunteering with the Rotary Club of Greenville, Clemson Corps, Greenville Women Giving, and her church.

GREENVILLE WOMEN GIVING

Our council was recently awarded \$88,540 by Greenville Women Giving. The funded program, Girls Who Thrive, will deliver the Girl Scouts' proven leadership program to low income and homeless girls in Greenville County over the next two years. Girls Who Thrive will create three dedicated troops. Troop 6000 will serve homeless girls in partnership with United Housing Connections, United Ministries, and the Salvation Army. Two troops, one at Welcome Elementary and the other at Grove Elementary, will serve low-income girls.

A program specialist will lead all troops and provide as a resource for parents to provide community contacts and act as an advocate for struggling families to help ensure that girls are able to grow, learn and thrive. During troop meetings and enrichment opportunities, girls will explore the arts, healthy living, business skills, outdoor/adventure, and STEM through hands-on, cooperative and girl-led learning.
